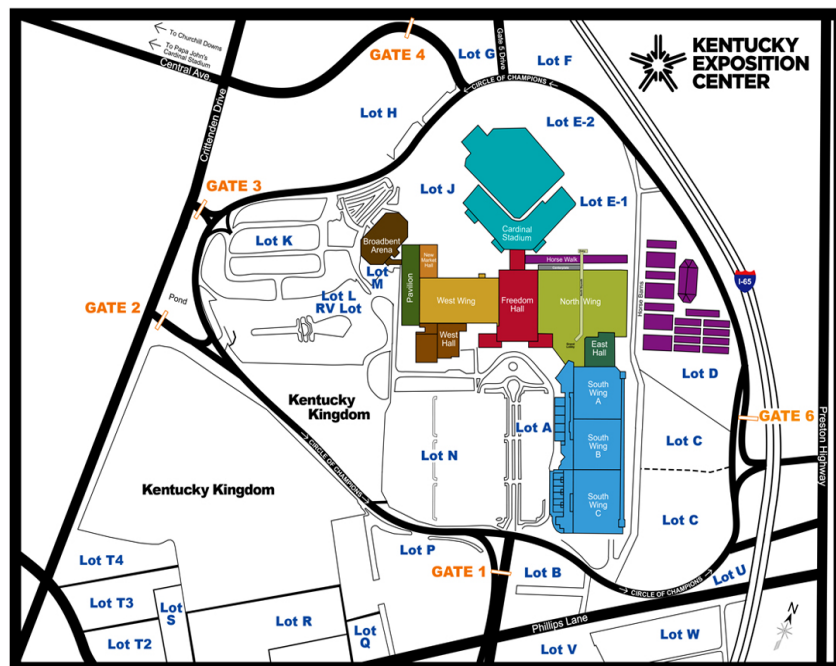

Entry Deadline

Entries must be made online on or before October 10, 2023 of the current year for all livestock entries. A late entry fee can be made online on or before October 17, 2023. See division rules for any associated fees. There are **no** refunds of entry fees. All phone conversations are informative only and are not to be considered binding in any litigation or entry acceptance. **Only online entries will be accepted with credit card payments at www.livestockexpo.org.**

Application for Entry: Phone entries **will not** be accepted. Credit cards (VISA, Master Card, Discover, or American Express) will be accepted for fee payments. All entries will receive acknowledgments.

NOTE: **Entry fees do not dictate stall space.** Exhibitors will only receive one cattle stall for every animal delivered to the North American International Livestock Exposition, regardless of the number of entries made for the show. A cow/calf pair is considered one entry, but the exhibitor is given two (2) stall spaces for the unit.

Other cattle will **not** be permitted in the tie-outs until after 6:00 p.m. Failure to have cattle on display in the buildings will result in forfeiture of premiums won and further disciplinary action by the Executive Committee, such as refusing to accept future entries.

Feed and Bedding: You may bring your own feed and bedding for your entries only or obtain it from our supplier. No other vendors of feed or bedding will be permitted on the grounds. Large square bales are permitted for first bedding, but thereafter, bedding must be stored in a trailer. No Kentucky Exposition Center (KEC) employees are permitted to move large bales. A one-day supply may be brought in each day from a trailer.

All **bulk orders of feed** or any type of **bulk bedding** must be coordinated and made in advance with the official supplier for the NAILE.

Dumping of truckloads of sand, sawdust, shavings, or tan bark will not be permitted in bulk in the barn. Baled shavings or wood chips and straw will be permitted and will be available from the official feed supplier or can be brought from home for your entries only.

Storage of large quantities of feed and bedding in the building will not be permitted. The definition of "large" quantities shall be at the discretion of NAILE or KEC employees. Extra feed and bedding must be kept in your trucks and trailers in the assigned parking area.

Show management is **NOT** required or expected to provide exhibitors stall space prior to dates and times listed in Premium Book.

Signs are **NOT** allowed to be placed on any walls or doors.

NAILE GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Exhibitors are requested to familiarize themselves with all the rules of this show applicable to their exhibits.

Violation of Rules

Rule 1. All entries for exhibits of any kind or character in this animal exhibit are subject to these regulations, and any violation will subject exhibitors to any penalties the Executive Committee may order.

Rule 2. The Exposition reserves to the General Manager and the Executive Committee the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, or differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or incident to, the show.

Ownership of Animals

Rule 3. All breeding animals in the purebred classes must have been owned by the exhibitor as of October 10, 2023. All Junior Show animals are required to be owned by and shown by the individual in whose name it is entered. (See the specific show for other rules and required dates.)

Accepting Entries

Rule 4. The show management reserves the right to accept or reject entirely, partially, or conditionally any entry or application. The management also reserves the right to personally, or appoint a committee to, inspect all entries after they have arrived, and dismiss any entries that would discredit the Exposition.

Erroneous Entries

Rule 5. Animals that have been erroneously entered may be transferred to their proper class prior to judging, upon application to the General Manager, who will appoint a committee to determine the case. If such classes have already been judged, however, they shall not be reopened.

Catalog Numbers

Rule 6. Each entry will be assigned a separate number in the official catalog of the Exposition. This numbered card must be displayed in the harness worn by the attendant when the animal is in the judging ring.

Assignment of Pens and Stalls

Rule 7. The assignment of all the spaces will be made by the superintendent of the breed of the show.

Care of Animals

Rule 8. The exhibitors themselves will be responsible for the delivery of their animals to the appropriate department at the designated times. Exhibitors will be required to attend to their animals while on exhibition and to have them presented to the judges when called. Any exhibitor who fails to present his or her animals in the ring when the class is called for to be weighed will be barred from the competition.

Appearance of Exhibits

Rule 9. The stalls, pens, and exhibition places must be cleaned before 8:00 a.m. each day and all refuse matter disposed of as the superintendent may direct. Exhibitors are required to be neatly dressed when exhibiting stock in the show ring.

Removal of Exhibits/Releases

Rule 10. If you exhibit at this Exposition you will be expected to keep your livestock on the grounds until the published

release date of your breed. All animals (except those shown) consigned to the various sales can be released immediately after the sale by obtaining a release slip from the General Superintendent's Office. Anyone removing livestock from the grounds without show management approval is subject to forfeiture of all premium money. Repeat violators will be subject to further action by the Executive Committee.

Rule 11. Releases will be required to leave ground per animal health concerns and liability reasons. Releases will be distributed through the Livestock Office.

Refusal to Parade in Shows

Rule 12. Livestock parades are a great educational feature of this show. For any cause not meeting with the approval of the management, exhibitors refusing to lead out their animals for parade or for competition in the show ring when called by superintendents in charge, will not only forfeit all prizes previously won but may be barred from further participation in the show.

Conduct

Rule 13. False representation, interference, or discourteous conduct by an exhibitor will be dealt with by the Executive Committee according to the equities of the case.

Substitutions

Rule 14. Substitutions will be accepted for animals within class only. Substitutions can be made only in the name of the original exhibitor/recorded owner as listed in the entry catalog. Breed shows without defined classes can substitute only an animal of the same sex with a birth date within 60 days of the entry being substituted for.

Judges

Judges are requested to be familiar with all the rules and regulations of this Exposition and to especially know the rules bearing on the classes they will be judging.

Unworthy Exhibits

Rule 15. The judges will not award prizes to any unworthy exhibit. Animals must be shown in such a manner as the judges require, and if the exhibitors refuse to submit to the requirements of the judges, their animals will be dismissed.

Time of Judging

Rule 16. All animals must be exhibited before the judge in the show ring, with catalog number attached, and cannot be awarded a prize while still in its stall or pen.

Decision of the Judges Final

Rule 17. The decision of the judges shall be final in all classes except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion not discovered at the time of the award is proven. In such case, the General Manager, or such referee or committee as may be appointed, may make decisions, or at its discretion the cases may be appealed to the Executive Committee from whose decisions there can be no appeal.

Awarding of Premiums

Rule 18. Only two premiums per recorded owner can be awarded in any one class.

Awarding of Champion Prizes

Rule 19. In all Championship classes, both a Champion and a Reserve Champion shall be selected. Only first place animals will be allowed to compete for championships. Second place winners in class from which the champion was selected are eligible to compete for Reserve Champion.

Premiums

Colored Ribbons

Rule 20. Premiums will be designated by ribbons: Blue, first; Red, second; White, third; Pink, fourth; Yellow, fifth; Dark Green, sixth; Light Green, seventh; Tan, eighth; Brown, ninth; Gray, tenth and over; Royal Purple, Champions; Lavender, Reserve Champions.

Paying Awards

Rule 21. Premiums will be forwarded to the exhibitors as they may direct, as soon after the close of the Exposition as

they can properly be processed. Cash premiums are payable by bank check. All premiums whatsoever not claimed by November 1 of the following year shall be deemed forfeited to the management or donors.

Special Premiums

Rule 22. All special premiums will be awarded by the judge after judging the regular awards. The Exposition is not responsible for the payment of special premiums, but they are all offered in good faith and should be paid promptly.

Protests

Rule 23. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$500, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protests must be delivered to the General Manager within six hours after the occasion of such protest, or if age is brought into question, one day prior to the day on which the animals are to be judged. Protests will be considered by the Executive Committee as quickly as possible, and their decision in the matter shall be final.

Rule 24. Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show.

Required Performance Data

Rule 25. In order to emphasize the use of, as well as the need for, performance data in beef cattle production, the following procedure will be maintained for all breed shows and the Junior Heifer Show. All animals will be weighed prior to entering the show ring. Each class will be called for separately to be weighed approximately one class prior to entering show ring. The total weight, as well as the weight per day of age, will be recorded on a card and placed in the exhibitor's harness. No bull can enter the show ring for competition without the weight card. The weighing of females will be at the discretion of each breed association. All junior show heifers will be weighed.

ALL ANIMALS WILL ENTER THE SHOW RING ACCORDING TO AGE
AS DIRECTED BY THE BREED SUPERINTENDENT.

Nurse Cows

Rule 26. Nurse cows are not permitted at the NAILE. Only cows nursing their natural calves that are entered in the show in the Cow/Calf Class, Senior Yearling, or Junior Yearling Heifer Classes are permitted.

Miscellaneous Rules and Regulations

Rule 27. It is mandatory that all exhibitors cooperate with Judging Contests officials in providing animals for use in the various judging contests.

Rule 28. All group entries are to be made at the show when entries are checked.

Rule 29. In the Beef Department, no more than one fan (overhead preferred) per three head of cattle will be allowed. No fans will be allowed in the aisles. Also, no portable generators are allowed in the building.

Rule 30. Breed registration: An animal is eligible to enter or compete in the Exposition in only one breed classification regardless if the animal is registered with one or more breed associations or registries. Percentage animals with more than one set of registration papers must be exhibited as entered on the original entry form. Percentage animals must be exhibited in the same Open and Junior Breed Show. No switching between breeds will be allowed. Furthermore, the animal must be registered in the recognized U.S. registry for their breed classification or, if registered in country of origin outside the U.S., the animal must be eligible for registry in the recognized U.S. registry. No changes will be permitted after a breed is designated.

Rule 31. Dogs will **not** be permitted on the grounds of the Kentucky Exposition Center during the course of the North American International Livestock Exposition, except those under leash control of the owner. Any dog running free will be impounded and removed from the grounds.

Rule 32. Any publications or lists prepared by the NAILE management are to be informative only and are **not** to be considered as legal documents of title or ownership.

Rule 33. If any damage, loss, or injury to person or property shall be caused by reason of any neglect or willful act of any person, firm, or corporation, or their agents, representatives, servants, or employees having license or privilege to exhibit, or occupy any space on the North American International Livestock Exposition grounds, the North American

International Livestock Exposition shall, in no manner, be responsible therefore, and in case it be subjected to any expense or liability, all persons causing same, or liable therefore, shall indemnify the NORTH AMERICAN INTERNATIONAL LIVESTOCK EXPOSITION.

Rule 34. All transit animals will require identification, health papers, and bill of sale to be on the grounds and must obtain a release from the Division of Animal Health before leaving grounds. 840 EID will be required for all Dairy, Beef, and Swine. Scrapie Tags will be required for all Sheep and Goats.

Rule 35. Aerosol spray cans are banned from the show ring and make-up ring.

Rule 36. Health Inspections will be conducted prior to entry onto the fairgrounds at the V Lot left of Gate 1 on Phillips Lane. All animals must have a valid Health Paper with Official USDA Identification (including all transit animals). After Health Paper inspection all animals must enter at Gate 1. Gate 1 will be open 24/7.

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the North American International Livestock Exposition. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain, free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event that culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved, and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory, and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug, or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) that could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals that affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices, such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices, is not acceptable and is prohibited.
7. Direct criticism of or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair, and livestock show management, or other show officials, shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect, and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or

persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including *Fairs and Expos* magazine and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action that contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Application for Entry: Phone entries **will not** be accepted. Credit cards (VISA, Master Card, Discover, or American Express) will be accepted for fee payments. All entries will receive acknowledgments.

NOTE: **Entry fees do not dictate stall space.** Exhibitors will only receive one cattle stall for every animal delivered to the North American International Livestock Exposition, regardless of the number of entries made for the show. A cow/calf pair is considered one entry, but the exhibitor is given two (2) stall spaces for the unit.

All Beef Sale animals are required to pay an entry fee in the show. Sale animals entered but not showing in the open show will be released after each sale is completed. Sale cattle will not be permitted in the tie-outs unless special permission is given by the management. Other cattle will **not** be permitted in the tie-outs until after 6:00 p.m. Failure to have cattle on display in the buildings will result in forfeiture of premiums won and further disciplinary action by the Executive Committee, such as refusing to accept future entries.

Feed and Bedding: You may bring your own feed and bedding for your entries only or obtain it from our supplier. No other vendors of feed or bedding will be permitted on the grounds. Large square bales are permitted for first bedding, but thereafter, bedding must be stored in a trailer. No Kentucky Exposition Center (KEC) employees are permitted to move large bales. A one-day supply may be brought in each day from a trailer.

All **bulk orders of feed** or any type of **bulk bedding** must be coordinated and made in advance with the official supplier for the NAILE.

Dumping of truckloads of sand, sawdust, shavings, or tan bark will not be permitted in bulk in the barn. Baled shavings or wood chips and straw will be permitted and will be available from the official feed supplier or can be brought from home for your entries only.

Storage of large quantities of feed and bedding in the building will not be permitted. The definition of "large" quantities shall be at the discretion of NAILE or KEC employees. Extra feed and bedding must be kept in your trucks and trailers in the assigned parking area.

Show management is **NOT** required or expected to provide exhibitors stall space prior to dates and times listed in Premium Book.

Signs are **NOT** allowed to be placed on any walls or doors.

NAILE GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Exhibitors are requested to familiarize themselves with all the rules of this show applicable to their exhibits.

Violation of Rules

Rule 1. All entries for exhibits of any kind or character in this animal exhibit are subject to these regulations, and any violation will subject exhibitors to any penalties the Executive Committee may order.

Rule 2. The Exposition reserves to the General Manager and the Executive Committee the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, or differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or incident to, the show.

Ownership of Animals

Rule 3. All breeding animals in the purebred classes must have been owned by the exhibitor as of October 10, 2023. All Junior Show animals are required to be owned by and shown by the individual in whose name it is entered. (See the specific show for other rules and required dates.)

Accepting Entries

Rule 4. The show management reserves the right to accept or reject entirely, partially, or conditionally any entry or application. The management also reserves the right to personally, or appoint a committee to, inspect all entries after they have arrived, and dismiss any entries that would discredit the Exposition.

Erroneous Entries

Rule 5. Animals that have been erroneously entered may be transferred to their proper class prior to judging, upon application to the General Manager, who will appoint a committee to determine the case. If such classes have already been judged, however, they shall not be reopened.

Catalog Numbers

Rule 6. Each entry will be assigned a separate number in the official catalog of the Exposition. This numbered card must be displayed in the harness worn by the attendant when the animal is in the judging ring.

Assignment of Pens and Stalls

Rule 7. The assignment of all the spaces will be made by the superintendent of the breed of the show.

Care of Animals

Rule 8. The exhibitors themselves will be responsible for the delivery of their animals to the appropriate department at the designated times. Exhibitors will be required to attend to their animals while on exhibition and to have them presented to the judges when called. Any exhibitor who fails to present his or her animals in the ring when the class is called for to be weighed will be barred from the competition.

Appearance of Exhibits

Rule 9. The stalls, pens, and exhibition places must be cleaned before 8:00 a.m. each day and all refuse matter disposed of as the superintendent may direct. Exhibitors are required to be neatly dressed when exhibiting stock in the show ring.

Removal of Exhibits/Releases

Rule 10. If you exhibit at this Exposition you will be expected to keep your livestock on the grounds until the published

release date of your breed. All animals (except those shown) consigned to the various sales can be released immediately after the sale by obtaining a release slip from the General Superintendent's Office. Anyone removing livestock from the grounds without show management approval is subject to forfeiture of all premium money. Repeat violators will be subject to further action by the Executive Committee.

Rule 11. Releases will be required to leave ground per animal health concerns and liability reasons. Releases will be distributed through the Livestock Office.

Refusal to Parade in Shows

Rule 12. Livestock parades are a great educational feature of this show. For any cause not meeting with the approval of the management, exhibitors refusing to lead out their animals for parade or for competition in the show ring when called by superintendents in charge, will not only forfeit all prizes previously won but may be barred from further participation in the show.

Conduct

Rule 13. False representation, interference, or discourteous conduct by an exhibitor will be dealt with by the Executive Committee according to the equities of the case.

Substitutions

Rule 14. Substitutions will be accepted for animals within class only. Substitutions can be made only in the name of the original exhibitor/recorded owner as listed in the entry catalog. Breed shows without defined classes can substitute only an animal of the same sex with a birth date within 60 days of the entry being substituted for.

Judges

Judges are requested to be familiar with all the rules and regulations of this Exposition and to especially know the rules bearing on the classes they will be judging.

Unworthy Exhibits

Rule 15. The judges will not award prizes to any unworthy exhibit. Animals must be shown in such a manner as the judges require, and if the exhibitors refuse to submit to the requirements of the judges, their animals will be dismissed.

Time of Judging

Rule 16. All animals must be exhibited before the judge in the show ring, with catalog number attached, and cannot be awarded a prize while still in its stall or pen.

Decision of the Judges Final

Rule 17. The decision of the judges shall be final in all classes except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion not discovered at the time of the award is proven. In such case, the General Manager, or such referee or committee as may be appointed, may make decisions, or at its discretion the cases may be appealed to the Executive Committee from whose decisions there can be no appeal.

Awarding of Premiums

Rule 18. Only two premiums per recorded owner can be awarded in any one class.

Awarding of Champion Prizes

Rule 19. In all Championship classes, both a Champion and a Reserve Champion shall be selected. Only first place animals will be allowed to compete for championships. Second place winners in class from which the champion was selected are eligible to compete for Reserve Champion.

Premiums

Colored Ribbons

Rule 20. Premiums will be designated by ribbons: Blue, first; Red, second; White, third; Pink, fourth; Yellow, fifth; Dark Green, sixth; Light Green, seventh; Tan, eighth; Brown, ninth; Gray, tenth and over; Royal Purple, Champions; Lavender, Reserve Champions.

Paying Awards

Rule 21. Premiums will be forwarded to the exhibitors as they may direct, as soon after the close of the Exposition as

they can properly be processed. Cash premiums are payable by bank check. All premiums whatsoever not claimed by November 1 of the following year shall be deemed forfeited to the management or donors.

Special Premiums

Rule 22. All special premiums will be awarded by the judge after judging the regular awards. The Exposition is not responsible for the payment of special premiums, but they are all offered in good faith and should be paid promptly.

Protests

Rule 23. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$500, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protests must be delivered to the General Manager within six hours after the occasion of such protest, or if age is brought into question, one day prior to the day on which the animals are to be judged. Protests will be considered by the Executive Committee as quickly as possible, and their decision in the matter shall be final.

Rule 24. Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show.

Required Performance Data

Rule 25. In order to emphasize the use of, as well as the need for, performance data in beef cattle production, the following procedure will be maintained for all breed shows and the Junior Heifer Show. All animals will be weighed prior to entering the show ring. Each class will be called for separately to be weighed approximately one class prior to entering show ring. The total weight, as well as the weight per day of age, will be recorded on a card and placed in the exhibitor's harness. No bull can enter the show ring for competition without the weight card. The weighing of females will be at the discretion of each breed association. All junior show heifers will be weighed.

ALL ANIMALS WILL ENTER THE SHOW RING ACCORDING TO AGE
AS DIRECTED BY THE BREED SUPERINTENDENT.

Nurse Cows

Rule 26. Nurse cows are not permitted at the NAILE. Only cows nursing their natural calves that are entered in the show in the Cow/Calf Class, Senior Yearling, or Junior Yearling Heifer Classes are permitted.

Miscellaneous Rules and Regulations

Rule 27. It is mandatory that all exhibitors cooperate with Judging Contests officials in providing animals for use in the various judging contests.

Rule 28. All group entries are to be made at the show when entries are checked.

Rule 29. In the Beef Department, no more than one fan (overhead preferred) per three head of cattle will be allowed. No fans will be allowed in the aisles. Also, no portable generators are allowed in the building.

Rule 30. Breed registration: An animal is eligible to enter or compete in the Exposition in only one breed classification regardless if the animal is registered with one or more breed associations or registries. Percentage animals with more than one set of registration papers must be exhibited as entered on the original entry form. Percentage animals must be exhibited in the same Open and Junior Breed Show. No switching between breeds will be allowed. Furthermore, the animal must be registered in the recognized U.S. registry for their breed classification or, if registered in country of origin outside the U.S., the animal must be eligible for registry in the recognized U.S. registry. No changes will be permitted after a breed is designated.

Rule 31. Dogs will **not** be permitted on the grounds of the Kentucky Exposition Center during the course of the North American International Livestock Exposition, except those under leash control of the owner. Any dog running free will be impounded and removed from the grounds.

Rule 32. Any publications or lists prepared by the NAILE management are to be informative only and are **not** to be considered as legal documents of title or ownership.

Rule 33. If any damage, loss, or injury to person or property shall be caused by reason of any neglect or willful act of any person, firm, or corporation, or their agents, representatives, servants, or employees having license or privilege to exhibit, or occupy any space on the North American International Livestock Exposition grounds, the North American

International Livestock Exposition shall, in no manner, be responsible therefore, and in case it be subjected to any expense or liability, all persons causing same, or liable therefore, shall indemnify the NORTH AMERICAN INTERNATIONAL LIVESTOCK EXPOSITION.

Rule 34. All transit animals will require identification, health papers, and bill of sale to be on the grounds and must obtain a release from the Division of Animal Health before leaving grounds. 840 EID will be required for all Dairy, Beef, and Swine. Scrapie Tags will be required for all Sheep and Goats.

Rule 35. Aerosol spray cans are banned from the show ring and make-up ring.

Rule 36. Health Inspections will be conducted prior to entry onto the fairgrounds at the V Lot left of Gate 1 on Phillips Lane. All animals must have a valid Health Paper with Official USDA Identification (including all transit animals). After Health Paper inspection all animals must enter at Gate 1. Gate 1 will be open 24/7.

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the North American International Livestock Exposition. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain, free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event that culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved, and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory, and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug, or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) that could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals that affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices, such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices, is not acceptable and is prohibited.
7. Direct criticism of or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair, and livestock show management, or other show officials, shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect, and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or

persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including *Fairs and Expos* magazine and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action that contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

- Any entries received after October 17 will not be accepted. To enter both the open and junior shows, you must pay the junior and open entry fees.
- If you exhibit in the Junior Show and did not enter the Open Show but wish to exhibit in the Open Show, you may enter the Open Show by paying a \$200 entry fee within one hour of the completion of your breed's Junior Show.

Additional Tie Space Fee

\$30 per 3.5 feet of tie space based on availability – This must be done at time of entry.

GENERAL RULES — DAIRY CATTLE DEPARTMENT

1. ALL ENTRIES MUST BE MADE IN NAME SHOWN ON REGISTRATION CERTIFICATE. EACH ANIMAL SHOULD BE ENTERED ON AN ENTRY FORM OR OVER THE INTERNET. NOTE: It is recommended that exhibitor and breeder be defined as follows: "Where a herd is registered in the names of different members of a family, residing on one farm, and when the herd is one unit, all entries may be considered as a single exhibitor for Premier Exhibitor, Premier Breeder, Dairy Herd, Junior Best Three Females, and Best Three Female Classes. An animal owned by any person in the 'Herd Unit' may be substituted for one owned by any other person in the 'Herd Unit.'"

Animals owned in partnership or by syndicate may be shown in the name of the partnership or syndicate only, except that at time of entry a determination shall be made that such animals will be shown in the name of one partner or syndicate member, and the animals must be shown the same way in the group classes, as they are in the open single classes.

Applications for entries in the cattle department must be filled in on the proper forms or internet, giving the name of the recorded owner, animal's name, number, and date of birth, and the name and number of the sire and dam of the animal to be exhibited. GROUP CLASS ENTRIES WILL BE MADE AT THE TIME PAPERS ARE CHECKED IN THE BARN.

Any applications or lists prepared by the NAILE management are to be informative only and are NOT to be considered as legal documents of title or ownership.

2. Each exhibitor will be required to present certificate of registration for his/her entries when called upon by the superintendent in charge.
3. All entries must be animals recorded in the American or foreign herd books for the particular breed to which they belong.
4. Showmanship classes: The age of the junior exhibitor is determined by January 1 of the current year. The animal used in showmanship must have been shown in the individual classes by the same exhibitor.
5. The drinking of alcohol by minors is prohibited per ABC guidelines and KEC policy.
6. The North American International Livestock Exposition will provide large, portable containers for disposal of manure and trash. These vehicles will be parked at various locations throughout livestock buildings at all times. When receptacles are full, they will be replaced by other receptacles. The area where receptacles sit should be clear at all times; no bedding or manure is to be heaped into this area at any time. Manure and trash must be put **into** the above containers for removal.
7. All exhibitors are limited to winning two premiums and two ribbons in each class and only one premium in group classes. Exception: Produce-of-Dam where produce is from two different dams.
8. Protests (See NAILE General Rules and Regulations, Rules #23 and #24).
9. The Exposition Management would appreciate the courtesy of all cattle exhibitors to remove all female cattle from the barns when they freshen and not return these animals to exhibition barns until they are thoroughly clean. This is only fair to the public and other exhibitors in that it removes any possible nuisance.
10. **Substitutions:** Substitutions are allowed in the same class with the same recorded owner or herd unit. In addition, two open substitutions (out of class) will be allowed per herd unit of the same breed. Once an animal has been substituted in either the Junior or Open Shows, the original animal entered shall be eliminated from any further competition.
11. Red & White Dairy Cattle are eligible to enter and compete in only one breed classification regardless of if the animal is registered with one or more breed associations or registries. Animals must be exhibited as entered on original entry form. Switching between breeds will not be allowed. Animals must be shown in the same breed for both the Open and Junior Dairy Show.
12. Health Regulations (See NAILE General Rules and Regulations).

13. ALL ANIMALS MUST BE RECORDED IN THE OWNER'S NAME PRIOR TO THE OPEN SHOW. TRANSFERS OF ANIMALS MUST BE COMPLETED BY AT LEAST ONE HOUR PRIOR TO THE OPEN BREED SHOW. ALL JUNIOR OWNED ANIMALS MUST FOLLOW REGISTRATION AND TRANSFER REQUIREMENTS PERTAINING TO DATES IN THE RULES OF THE VARIOUS JUNIOR SHOWS.
14. Any dairy cattle sale animals can be entered in the open show after their breed sale (within one hour) in the name of the new recorded owner only. The open show entry fee of \$45.00 will be required, no late entry fee will be assessed. They must remain until the other show cattle are released if they are shown.
15. **Only one (1) handler per animal will be allowed in the ring for the Open Show.**
16. The moving of stall assignments by exhibitors is **not** allowed. Violators will be subject to further action by NAILE staff.
17. All animals in production classes are subject to ultrasound testing and milk sample testing. The testing is pursuant to Kentucky Law KRS 246, dealing with unethical practices used in regard to livestock and the criminal penalties involved. In order to maintain the integrity of the exhibition and presentation of dairy animals, the NAILE will continue a testing program at this year's Exposition. Animals may be required to be ultrasounded and milk samples taken if deemed necessary by show officials. Failure to follow the request of show officials may cause disqualification of all of the exhibitor's entries.
18. **All champion and reserve cows will be ultrasounded and milk samples taken. This includes, but is not limited to, breed champions, the Jersey Jug Futurity Champions, Supreme Champion, and any other animal if deemed necessary by show officials.**
19. **No barbed or pronged halters are allowed.**
20. Dairy animals must have a permanent identification, and this permanent identification must match the animal identification on the animal health papers. **All Dairy Cattle must have a USDA-approved premise 840 EID tag.**
21. **Water Tanks** — Cattle are to be watered in the exhibitor's stall area only.
22. **Bedding** — Storage of large quantities of feed and bedding in the building will **not** be permitted. Extra feed and bedding must be kept in your trucks and trailers in the assigned parking area. Truckloads of sand, sawdust, shavings, or tan bark will not be permitted to dump in bulk in the barn. Baled shavings or wood chips and straw will be permitted and will be available from the official feed supplier or can be brought from home for your entries only.

Large bales are permitted for first bedding, but thereafter must be stored in a trailer. No KEC employees are permitted to move large bales. A one-day supply of hay or straw may be brought into the barn each day. **NO ROUND BALES ARE PERMITTED INSIDE THE BARN.**
23. **NAILE Milkout Procedures**
 - a. The call for a milkout can be a breed association rule, a judge's request, the Ethics Committee request, or a NAILE management request.
 - b. The announcement for a milkout must be made while the cows are still in the show ring.
 - c. The cows must be escorted from the show ring to the milking parlor by a representative selected by the breed association. Any identification problems on a cow will be resolved by a breed association representative.
 - d. All cows must be taken directly to the KEC milking parlor and checked by the official veterinarian. The use of an individual's portable milker must take place in the milking parlor or location designated by KEC.
 - e. The procedures for sampling the milk will be supervised by the Kentucky Milk Safety inspectors. The NAILE official veterinarian will be responsible for witnessing the milkout of each cow and can inspect the milk and udders before, during, and after the milkout.

- f. When cows are returned to the show ring, they must be escorted directly from the milking parlor to the show ring. The NAILE official veterinarian will be available if the judge requests a consultation.
- g. The only provision for photographs will be those taken in the show ring during the award presentations.
- h. The definition of a milkout would be the removal of all milk in the udder comparable to the normal daily management practices of a dairy cow.
- i. All violators of the PDCA show ring code of ethics (see pages 14-16) will follow the guidelines stated in the PDCA Enforcement Procedures previously listed. A Milk Safety inspector will be available for assistance if requested.

**The Jersey Jug Milkout will follow the American Jersey Cattle Association Milkout rules.*

Junior Dairy Supreme Champion Show

On Friday, November 3 at 5:00 p.m. a Supreme Champion Cow and Heifer will be selected from all Breed Champions. \$2,000.00 and a banner will be awarded to the Supreme Champion Cow of the Junior Show, and \$500.00 and a banner will be awarded to the Supreme Champion Heifer. Reserve Supreme Heifer will receive a large rosette and \$250.00. The Reserve Supreme Cow will receive a large rosette and \$500.00.

Open Dairy Supreme Champion Show

At the completion of the final Open Dairy Breed Show, on Monday, November 6, a Supreme Champion Cow will be selected from all Breed Champions. \$2,000.00 and a banner will be awarded to the Supreme Champion Cow of the Open Show. The Reserve Supreme Cow will receive a large rosette and \$500.00. Supreme Champion Heifer will receive a banner and will be awarded \$500. The Reserve Supreme Heifer will receive a large rosette and \$250.

David Sparrow Herdsman Award

(To be presented at the Open Supreme Selection)

Special prizes will be awarded in the dairy department to the herdsman or caretaker in charge of livestock exhibits. A committee appointed by the management will make inspections during the week to determine those who, in their judgment, make the best record for the period of the show, taking into consideration the following points:

1. Neatness and attractiveness of exhibit, bedding, signs, etc.30
2. Appearance of animals at all times.....30
3. Cleanliness of aisle behind cattle..... 15
4. Exhibitor's behavior while at Exposition 15
5. Friendliness toward other exhibitors 10
- Total.....100**

Awards for Dairy: First Place award for each breed presented by North American International Livestock Exposition.

The following Premier Exhibitor Award and Premier Breeder Award will be given for each breed.

Premier Exhibitor Award

This award is to be made to the exhibitor winning the most points on no more than six animals owned and exhibited by himself/herself in the open single classes. No more than one of the six is to be bulls. (There is no limit on the number exhibited, but the award is automatically figured on the top six animals winning the most points.) – Banner

Premier Breeder Award

This award is to be made to the breeder on no more than six animals winning the most points in open single class, including animals bred by him/her but exhibited by others. No more than one of the six is to be bulls. (There is no limit on the number exhibited, but the award is automatically figured on the top six animals winning the most points.) – Banner

In case of a tie on the points system, the exhibitor or breeder winning the most money on the same animals will be awarded the prize. In case of partnership animals, the person who enters the exhibits will receive the points; however, if the animal is entered in a partnership name, then the partnership will receive the total points.

The Point System for determining Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor is as follows for most breeds. (Some breeds have a different point system. Check your breed show information to verify.)

If there is still a tie on the points system, Grand Champion animals will be given 3 points, Reserve Champion animals 2 points, and Junior, Intermediate, or Senior Champions and Reserves will be given 1 point to break the tie.

Best Udder Award

It is recommended that in each of the milking cow classes the judge selects the 1st and 2nd best uddered cows in each class. This selection shall be made on the basis of udder alone, and a milkout will be at the discretion of the judge. It is recommended that the two cows in each class be given special recognition just prior to the final placing of their respective class. The best uddered cows from each of the classes will not compete for an overall best udder award of the show.

Garland Bastin – North American International Livestock Exposition Scholarship Award

Garland Bastin served as the NAILE General Superintendent for 27 years, from the show's founding until his death in 2000. He was an individual with the highest integrity who truly loved young people. He believed that exhibitors of animals at livestock shows should at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment should reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity. The NAILE Executive Committee is proud to offer a **\$1,000** scholarship in memory of this extraordinary man.

Scholarship Rules:

- To be eligible you must be a high school senior during the current school year.
- To be eligible you must exhibit at least one animal in the NAILE Junior Dairy Show in the year that you apply for the award.
- To be eligible you must be available for the award presentation during the NAILE Junior Supreme Dairy Show.

The application will be judged by a panel of livestock industry professionals. Judges' decision is final. The application will be judged on the following basis:

- 35% — Academic and achievements
- 30% — Involvement with dairy cattle
- 35% — Essay

Payment of the scholarship will be made upon proof of acceptance for enrollment in a college or other institute of higher learning. Payment will be made directly to the recipient. The scholarship is only available for payment within a 24-month period after it has been presented.

Application Process:

Complete the application form and essay. Essay and all attachments must be typewritten/word processed.

- Submit an official high school transcript.
- Submit a letter of recommendation from one of the following:
 - 4-H Agent
 - FFA Advisor or other high school teacher

Request an application form from the NAILE office. Your application must be postmarked no later than September 30 of the current year.

THE PUREBRED DAIRY CATTLE ASSOCIATION SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

(adopted by PDCA May 5, 2015)

The showing of registered dairy cattle stimulates and sustains interest in the breeding of registered dairy cattle. It is also an important part of the promotion, merchandising, and breeding program of many breeders. For these reasons, the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association (PDCA) believes that it is in the best interest of all breeders of registered dairy cattle to maintain a reputation of integrity in dairy cattle shows and to present a wholesome and progressive image of dairy cattle in the show ring.

PDCA endorses this Show Ring Code of Ethics for all dairy breed shows and pledges its full cooperative support for its enforcement to show management, show judges, and the national breed associations.

The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics. Dairy cattle exhibitors shall, at all times, deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.

It is recognized that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle that are necessary in the course of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy state so they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal condition. At all times, exhibition livestock shall be treated in a humane manner and in accordance with dairy quality assurance practices so as to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the livestock and the consuming public. No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he or she knows, or has reason to suspect, is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease, or illegal or non-approved use of drugs, medication, prohibited substance, and/or residue.

The position of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association is that all animals presented for exhibition shall be in their natural conformation and structure, free of any alteration or modification by injection or internal or external administration of any substance or by any involvement in unethical fitting.

Grooming and Preparation

Dairy cattle exhibitions are conducted under standards for evaluating conformation established by the PDCA *Unified Score Card* (1994), with specific breed characteristics taken into consideration by the show judge. In this connection, animals will be groomed and prepared for the judge's evaluation in order to display the animal's natural contour, conformation, performance, and mobility. Specifically:

1. Changing the natural color of the animal is prohibited. However, external applications of cosmetics that affect only appearance may be used, including by way of example hoof polishes and false switches.
2. The maximum allowable length of naturally growing hair anywhere on the topline is not to exceed 1". (See Holstein rules concerning hair length.) Exhibitors will be required to comply with this rule before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.
3. Addition of foreign objects, including but not limited to hair or hair substitutes, cloth, or fiber, to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body is prohibited.
4. Externally sealing the teat end with a preparation that does not harm the animal's skin is permissible. Natural teat placement will be given preference over artificially positioned teats.

Violations: False, Deceptive, or Unacceptable Practices

These practices are violations of the Code of Ethics and will be reported to show management and may be reported to the respective national breed associations:

5. Misrepresenting the age and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
6. Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally:
 - a. with an irritant or counter-irritant,
 - b. using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease,

- c. using other substances as detected by testing that cause changes in the udder to artificially improve the conformation.
 - d. plugging of teat canal with foreign substances.
7. Surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body (e.g., administration of fluid via a stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen), though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
 8. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management, or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.
 9. Challenging, threatening, or interfering with an ethics committee appointed by show management to monitor the animals on exhibit on the show grounds.

Exhibitor Responsibility

The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, and/or absolutely responsible person (hereinafter referred to as "Exhibitor") for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, milk, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Materials may also be collected by ultrasound and photographic methods and by direct examination of the animal.

The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor") to have disciplinary action for violation of this Show Ring Code of Ethics taken by show management, the state in which the show occurs, and/or the national dairy breed association without recourse.

Show Ethics Committee

Each show should have an Ethics Committee. The makeup of this committee should include official breed representatives, representative(s) of show management (e.g., dairy cattle show superintendent, General Manager), the official show veterinarian, and Extension representative.

The Ethics Committee will be responsible for monitoring violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. The Ethics Committee will investigate the report of any violation and determine the accuracy of the allegation. The Ethics Committee will have the authority to inspect animals and related material to determine if violations have occurred.

Violations: Reporting and Investigation

Complaints of alleged violations can be reported to the breed superintendent, the show superintendent, show management, and/or the Ethics Committee.

Before an Animal Is Shown

If the Ethics Committee suspects that a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics will occur if the animal is shown, and that violation is reasonably well established before the animal is shown, the Ethics Committee will submit a report to show management.

Show management will discuss the violation with the Exhibitor:

10. If, at the Exhibitor's discretion, the animal in question is not shown, no violation will have occurred.
11. If the Exhibitor wishes to challenge that a violation occurred, he/she/they will have opportunity to appeal to the Ethics Committee. If its decision is not changed, the Exhibitor will be denied opportunity to exhibit the animal in question.

During and After an Animal Is Shown

All animals are subject to examination during judging. The judge and Ethics Committee are instructed to examine the top five (5) animals in each class closely for violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. When a violation may have occurred, a milkout may be called for. This call may be by breed association rule, or by request of an authorized representative of the national breed association, the judge, the Ethics Committee, or show management.

If an animal is exhibited and a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics is subsequently suspected,

investigated, and determined to have occurred, the violation will be reported to the Ethics Committee and show management for action. The Exhibitor will be notified of the violation, with the supporting evidence, and is invited to defend or explain the allegations.

Violations are subject to the disciplinary provisions of show management, the state in which the show occurs, and the national dairy breed association. Sanctions may include any one, or combination of the following:

- forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums, or proceeds;
- written letter of reprimand to the owner, exhibitor, fitter, and/or absolutely responsible person (the “Exhibitor”);
- disqualification of the exhibition livestock from an exhibition;
- disqualification of the Exhibitor from the show;
- publication of offense.

Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years.

History: Adopted by PDCA in March 1969, revised March 1971, February 1977, February 1981, February 1986, February 1988, February 1989, February 1992, February 1993, November 1995, April 2002; April 2004.

The North American International Livestock Exposition Board has approved the above code provided it is enforced by a committee, including official show veterinarian, and provided the rules are enforced in such a manner they do not preclude normal, needed veterinary care.

MILKING PARLOR

The North American International Livestock Exposition will have a milking parlor for the convenience of the dairy exhibitors, and everyone is welcome to use it. Any exhibitor wishing to bring a portable milking stand for their own use must also bring milk cans.

1st Milking – Monday Night, October 30

Last Milking – Tuesday Morning, November 7

Milking Parlor Rules

1. ALL milk from each exhibitor's cattle will be tested for the presence of antibiotics at each milking.
2. All bulk tanks will be tested for antibiotics prior to delivery to a processing plant. Tanks of milk found to contain antibiotics shall be disposed of.
3. Any exhibitor found offering milk for sale containing antibiotics or other unacceptable milk may be penalized.
4. The North American International Livestock Exposition Executive Committee may bar repeat or chronic violators from participating in the Exposition.

Junior Show Rules

1. **Eligibility:** Must be a National Ayrshire Junior Member. Applications and payment can be made at Louisville. Exhibitors may participate the year of their ninth birthday and until December 31 of the year in which he or she turns 21 years old.
2. **Ownership: Animals may be owned solely by the junior exhibitor or in a partnership, provided the junior exhibitor's name appears on the registration papers, prior to August 1.** All purchased animals must be transferred by August 1. The recorded date, not the delivery date, will be considered the transfer date. Registration papers will be checked at the show. In lieu of ownership, a lease agreement will be accepted. An approved lease of a 4-H, state, or FFA program will be recognized upon verification at the National Ayrshire Office by August 1. If a lease program is not available in your state, a form may be obtained from the National office.
3. **Participation:**
 - a. Only one animal may be exhibited by each exhibitor in each class. Not more than four may be shown in the entire show that were not bred by the exhibitor. In order to qualify as breeder, the registration papers must show the junior exhibitor or a partnership including the junior exhibitor as the breeder.
 - b. To be eligible to compete for the cash awards, ribbons, or recognition, an animal must be shown by the junior in all cases except by prior written approval. If approved, another junior must show the animal. Adults are not allowed to show in any case or assist with the State Herd class.
 - c. A “dress code” will be strictly enforced for juniors showing at national shows. **White** pants with a “neat” shirt must be worn or the junior exhibitor will not be allowed to show his/her animal. No leeway or special allowance will be made to this rule.
4. Health Requirements are the same as the Open Show.

Awards

3. **Louis Zumbach Grand Champion Award** – National Junior Show – An award will be presented to the Grand Champion Junior animal at all national shows. This award is in memory of Louis Zumbach and is funded by the Louis Zumbach Fund of the National Ayrshire Breeders' Association.
4. **National Youth Junior Champion Award** – National Junior Show – A sculpted, engraved plaque will be awarded to the Junior Champion animal at all national shows. This award will be individually sponsored, and the sponsorship will be announced at the time of presentation. This award is being coordinated by the National Youth Fund of the Ayrshire Breeders' Association.
5. **Louis Zumbach Total Performance Award** – A silver platter and certificate will be awarded to the top junior owned and exhibited animal for total performance. A total performance score is placed on each animal, three years old and over, based on 100 points as follows:

Definitions

EXHIBITOR: The exhibitor must be the owner. In case a herd is registered or bred in the names of different members of a family, residing on one farm or breeding establishment, and where the herd is one unit, all entries may be considered as a single exhibitor for all group classes. However, members of one family, where cattle are not housed as one unit, will not be considered as a single exhibitor.

OWNERSHIP: To be eligible for competition, whether single or in groups, animals must be entered exactly as ownership appears on the registration paper. The registration certificate showing the most recent date of activity will be considered official. Sale animal ownership will be that of the consignor. Registration certificates showing ownership must be made available. Animals owned in partnership may be shown in the name of the partnership only, except for “Family Unit” as defined above. For example, if Exhibitor A and Exhibitor B own an animal in partnership and each owns animals individually, three separate exhibitors exist: one for Exhibitor A, one for Exhibitor B, and one for the Exhibitor A & B partnership. To qualify for Bred and Owned awards, one of the original owners must be listed as one of the current owners.

Any animal sold or exhibited as registered by the Brown Swiss Cattle Breeders Association can be blood/DNA typed at the discretion of the Executive Secretary. All expenses to be paid by Brown Swiss Cattle Breeders Association.

Animals eligible to be shown at a National Brown Swiss show will have the following registration certificates: Standard Registration Certificate which is white with a green border is issued for Registered Brown Swiss Females and Certified Identity Enrolled Females (CIE); Brown Swiss Step II Identity Enrollment (IE) animals, which have a green registration paper with a black border, may also be shown. Animals with other colored papers cannot be shown.

Type and Production Award

The requirements a cow must meet to qualify for the Total Performance class are as follows:

9. Born before September 1, 2018;
10. Completed three lactations by July 1, 2023;
11. Possess at least one official DHI record in 305 days, of at least 20,000 pounds of milk, 800 pounds of butterfat, or 700 pounds of protein;
12. Place in the top 50% of her respective class (top five if there are fewer than 10 in class) and;
13. Diagnosed pregnant if last calving or embryo collection is more than 12 months prior to the show date.

Official lifetime production records on all qualifying cows must be sent to and received by the National Brown Swiss office at least two weeks prior to show day so that records can be verified and production scores calculated. Records received after that will be accepted only with a \$50.00 late fee. The DHI sheet showing credits up through July 1 will be accepted to update lifetime records. It is the owner's responsibility to supply these records, including the July test sheet.

2023 Fight Bac Guernsey Gold National Three-Year-Old Futurity

The Guernsey Gold Futurity will be shown Sunday, November 5 at 7:30 a.m.

General Rules

The Futurity is for three-year-old cows born from September 1, 2019 through August 31, 2020. To be eligible for entry into the show, all four payments (\$3, \$5, \$10, \$25) must have been received by the American Guernsey Association (AGA) by the appropriate deadline. The fourth payment of \$35.00 must be sent to the AGA by October 15, 2023. The AGA board of directors is at all times the governing body of this Futurity. All matters pertaining to the showing of this Futurity are subject to the rules and regulations of the NAILE.

Premier Points

The first- and second-place winners will compete for the NGS-Louisville intermediate champion and will qualify for premier breeder, exhibitor, and sire points. The remaining entries will not qualify for premier points in the Guernsey Gold Futurity, but will be allowed to show in the NGS-Louisville if proper entry has been made. If the first- or second-place animal is shown in the NGS-Louisville three-year-old cow class, then the premier points earned in the Guernsey Gold Futurity must be forfeited. The premier points would then result from the animal's placing in the NGS-Louisville three-year-old cow class.

Premiums

The money collected from entry fees minus expenses will be given to exhibitors showing in the Guernsey Gold Futurity. The breakdown of premiums is as follows:

1st – 15%

2nd – 12.5%

3rd – 10%

4th – 7.5%

5th thru 10th – 5%

11th thru 25th – Remainder of pot divided equally to these finishers but not to exceed the premium paid to higher-placing finishers.

These figures are subject to change depending upon number shown.

“Total Performance Cow Award”

Eligibility

Animals must place in the top 50% of their respective classes to compete. A cow must have at least two completed records of 305 days or less. Both records used must be DHIR or DHI. An average of the top two completed 305 days or less actual production records will be used. Yield Deviation (YD) on official AGA pedigrees will be used, and the type appraisal scores will be verified. Dry cows are not eligible. This is not a lead-out class; however, the winning animal will be asked to return to the ring and the awards presentation will be made at this time.

Points will be calculated as follows:

Production – 10 points for each 1,000 pounds of milk based on the average of the top two records. One point for each 10 pounds of combined butterfat and protein (CFP) based on the average of the top two records.

Yield Deviation – 10 points for each 100 pounds of milk, one point for each pound of CFP.

Appraisal Score – The cow's current official appraisal score will be doubled.

Show Placings – Points will be awarded on the basis of the official placing in the class. These points will be taken from the scale used for Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor and multiplied by 20 to equal show points.

Breeder – 50 bonus points shall be awarded if the exhibitor is the breeder of the animal.

If a tie should exist, a lactation factor shall be applied, with 10 points being awarded for each lactation the cow has completed.

Total Performance Cow Award

Production Awards

Ribbons will be awarded by the American Guernsey Association to the Junior and Senior three-year-old, four-year-old, five-year-old, and aged cows with the highest actual 305-day milk, butterfat, and protein production records.

These awards will be based on the most recent 305-day records produced on DHIR or DHI test. Exhibitors may provide updated official test sheets to document production.

1. Eligibility for Participation – Any boy or girl who meets the following qualifications is eligible to participate:
 - a. Age is limited to boys and girls who are at least 8 and younger than 21 on January 1 of this calendar year.
 - b. All exhibitors will be required to wear white clothes while exhibiting their animals. Shirts or other items of clothing with a farm name will not be allowed. Junior show shirts provided by the AGA must be worn.**
 - c. The participant must be an AGA Junior member and the recorded owner of one or more registered Guernsey Females, properly recorded in the Herd Register of the American Guernsey Association or a respective National Guernsey Association or a participant in the American Guernsey Association Youth Lease Agreement Program.
 - d. The qualifying record of ownership or lease for animals, other than those bred by the junior exhibitor, shall be determined by the actual date the application for transfer of ownership was received in the office of the American Guernsey Association. This date is automatically stamped on the back of the registration certificate and will be found with the transfer of ownership data. The qualifying dates are:

In classes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 8, 9, 10, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, and 19, the date of sale stamped on the registration certificate must be prior to August 1, 2023.
 - e. In all classes, the recorded ownership must show in the sole ownership of the exhibitor or partnership comprised of only junior members or be a participant in the American Guernsey Association Youth Lease Agreement Program.
 - f. If the participant is exhibiting under the American Guernsey Association Youth Lease Agreement Program, all guidelines and terms must have been followed and a copy of the signed and dated agreement must be present.
3. Frequency of Participation – Any boy or girl who meets eligibility to participate may exhibit in as many years as his or her eligibility will permit.
4. Entries Exhibited
 - a. Each eligible exhibitor is limited to two entries in any one class and is eligible to show in each class.
 - b. There is no limitation on the number of times an eligible animal may be exhibited.
 - c. To be eligible to compete, an animal must be shown by an approved Junior. If approved, another Junior member the same age or younger may show the animal. Adults are not allowed to show in any case. Another Junior may assist in the show ring should difficulties arise during a class. Substitute showmen must be approved by the American Guernsey Association prior to the show.

- a. Entries are to be made via the internet as available from the North American International Livestock Exposition, for both the National Guernsey Junior Show and the Open National Guernsey Show. Entries in the open show are subject to the entry deadlines and rules as set forth in the premium list published by each respective fair site, and reference to these rules is suggested.
- b. Entries are to be submitted directly to the North American International Livestock Exposition by the established deadline. Show management will forward entries to the American Guernsey Association to verify eligibility.

6. Ribbons will be awarded in each class.
7. Health requirements are the same as the open show.
8. The American Guernsey Association will not be liable for the safety of animals or exhibits, exhibitors, or their employees against robbery, damage by fire, accident, or any other cause.
9. **Additional Junior Show eligibility rules may apply.**

Junior Showmanship contest will be the last classes of the Guernsey Junior Show. The contest will consist of three classes: 12 years of age & under, 13-15 years of age, and 16 years of age and over, as of January 1, 2023. A National Guernsey Member is eligible to show a Guernsey in the showmanship class even if they did not show in class.

Show Rules

1. All animals must have registration papers in the exhibitor's name or a photostatic copy of valid papers in process for registration or transfer (to be collected by the superintendent and forwarded to Holstein Association USA) to be eligible to show. Exhibitors must have a registration paper with photo identification or two eartags. No animal will be checked into the books without this proper identification.
2. Animals owned in partnership or by syndicate may be shown in the name of the partnership or syndicate only; except that at time of entry a determination shall be made that such animals will be shown in the name of one partner or syndicate member and the animals must be shown the same way in the group classes, as they are in the open single classes.

The judge will name the first and second best udder in each milking class. First and second place ribbons will be presented.

Exhibitors competing for the Grand Champion have the option to milk out their cows before the Grand Champion class. If they choose to milk out, the exhibitor must go through the ultrasound and milk test procedures **first**.

The Purebred Dairy Cattle Association Show Ring Code of Ethics, adopted May 5, 2015

The showing of registered dairy cattle stimulates and sustains interest in the breeding of registered dairy cattle. It is also an important part of the promotion, merchandising, and breeding program of many breeders. For these reasons, the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association (PDCA) believes that it is in the best interest of all breeders of registered dairy cattle to maintain a reputation of integrity in dairy cattle shows and to present a wholesome and progressive image of dairy cattle in the show ring.

PDCA endorses this Show Ring Code of Ethics for all dairy breed shows and pledges its full cooperative support for its enforcement to show management, show judges, and the national breed associations.

The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics. Dairy cattle exhibitors shall, at all times, deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.

It is recognized that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle that are necessary in the course of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy state so they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal condition. At all times, exhibition livestock shall be treated in a humane manner and in accordance with dairy quality assurance practices so as to protect the health, safety and welfare of the livestock and the consuming public. No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he or she knows, or has reason to suspect, is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease, or illegal or non-approved use of drugs, medication and/or prohibited substance, or residue.

The position of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association is that all animals presented for exhibition shall be in their natural conformation and structure, free of any alteration or modification by injection or internal or external administration of any substance or by any involvement in unethical fitting.

Grooming and Preparation

Dairy cattle exhibitions are conducted under standards for evaluating conformation established by the PDCA Unified Score Card (2009), with specific breed characteristics taken into consideration by the show judge. In this connection, animals will be groomed and prepared for the judge's evaluation in order to display the animal's natural

contour, conformation, performance and mobility. Specifically:

3. Changing the natural color of the animal is prohibited (effective 6/1/2015). However, external applications of cosmetics that affect only appearance may be used, including by way of example hoof polishes and false switches.
4. The maximum allowable length of naturally growing hair anywhere on the topline is not to exceed 1" (Holstein guidelines will allow up to 1½"). Exhibitors will be required to comply with this rule before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.
5. Addition of foreign objects, including but not limited to hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber, to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body is prohibited.
6. Externally sealing the teat end with a preparation that does not harm the animal's skin is permissible. Natural teat placement will be given preference over artificially positioned teats.

Violations: False, Deceptive or Unacceptable Practices

These practices are violations of the Code of Ethics and will be reported to show management and may be reported to the respective national breed associations:

7. Misrepresenting the age and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
8. Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally:
 - a. with an irritant or counter-irritant,
 - b. using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease,
 - c. using other substances as detected by testing that causes changes in the udder to artificially improve the conformation.
 - d. plugging of teat canal with foreign substances.
9. Surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body (e.g., administration of fluid via a stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen), though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
10. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.
11. Challenging, threatening or interfering with an ethics committee appointed by show management to monitor the animals on exhibit on the show grounds.

Exhibitor Responsibility

The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (hereinafter referred to as "Exhibitor") for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, milk, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Materials may also be collected by ultrasound and photographic methods and by direct examination of animal.

The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/ or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor") to have disciplinary action for violation of this Show Ring Code of Ethics taken by show management, the state in which the show occurs, and/or the national dairy breed association without recourse.

Show Ethics Committee

Each show should have an Ethics Committee. The make-up of this committee should include official breed representatives, representative(s) of show management (e.g., dairy cattle show superintendent, General Manager), the official show veterinarian, and Extension representative.

The Ethics Committee will be responsible for monitoring violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. The Ethics Committee will investigate the report of any violation and determine the accuracy of the allegation. The Ethics Committee will have the authority to inspect animals and related material to determine if violations have occurred.

Violations: Reporting and Investigation

Complaints of alleged violations can be reported to the breed superintendent, the show superintendent, show management, and/or the Ethics Committee.

Before an Animal Is Shown

If the Ethics Committee suspects that a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics will occur if the animal is shown, and that violation is reasonably well established before the animal is shown, the Ethics Committee will submit a report to show management.

Show management will discuss the violation with the exhibitor:

1. If, at the exhibitor's discretion, the animal in question is not shown, no violation will have occurred.
2. If the exhibitor wishes to challenge that a violation occurred, he/she/they will have opportunity to appeal to the Ethics Committee. If its decision is not changed, the Exhibitor will be denied opportunity to exhibit the animal in question.

During and After an Animal Is Shown

All animals are subject to examination during judging. The judge and Ethics Committee are instructed to examine the top five (5) animals in each class closely for violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. When a violation may have occurred, a milkout may be called for. This call may be by breed association rule, or by request of an authorized representative of the national breed association, the judge, the Ethics Committee, or show management.⁶⁰

If an animal is exhibited and a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics is subsequently suspected, investigated, and determined to have occurred, the violation will be reported to the Ethics Committee and show management for action. The exhibitor will be notified of the violation and the supporting evidence and invited to defend or explain the allegations.

Violations are subject to the disciplinary provisions of show management, the state in which the show occurs, and the national dairy breed association. Sanctions may include any one, or combination of the following:

- forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums or proceeds;
- written letter of reprimand to the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "exhibitor");
- disqualification of the exhibition livestock from an exhibition;
- disqualification of the exhibitor from the show;
- publication of offense.

Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years.

Class Rules

The following class rules are to be followed at all National Holstein Shows:

1. Only animals of 87% Registered Holstein Ancestry or higher will be eligible.
2. Bred and Owned Recognition Rules

To be considered for Bred & Owned awards, one of the original owners must be listed as one of the current owners. Where a herd is registered in the names of different members of a family and where the herd is one unit, all entries may be considered as exhibits of one breeder.

Note: Please refer to the Junior Holstein Showring Policy, Rule F, for the definition of Bred and Owned for Junior Shows.

3. Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor Rules

- a. Premier Breeder

The owner of the dam at the time of service shall be considered the breeder of the animal. Where a

herd is registered in the names of different members of a family, and where the herd is one unit, all entries may be considered as exhibits of one breeder. Otherwise, when animals are bred in partnership, each unique partnership is considered a unique breeder.

The exhibitor winning the most points (for a maximum of six animals exhibited in the open single classes by him/herself and/or other exhibitors) shall be designated the Premier Breeder. In classes with ten animals or less, no more than two head per breeder will be counted toward premier points.

b. Premier Exhibitor

The exhibitor must be the owner. In case a herd is registered or bred in the names of different members of a family, residing on one farm or breeding establishment, and where the herd is one unit, all entries may be considered as a single exhibitor for all group classes. However, members of one family, where cattle are not housed as one unit, will not be considered as a single exhibitor. When animals are owned in partnership, each unique partnership is considered a unique exhibitor.

The exhibitor winning the most points (for a maximum of six animals which he/she owns and exhibits in the open single classes) shall be designated the Premier Exhibitor. In classes with ten animals or less, no more than two head per breeder will be counted toward premier points.

4. Group Class Rules

Junior Best Three & Best Three Females – Entries in the group classes must be entered and shown in their individual animal classes. All must be bred by the exhibitor and at least one animal must be owned (solely or in partnership) by the exhibitor.

Breeder is identified as listed on the registration paper. Where animals are bred by different members of a family, and where the herd is one unit, they are considered as bred by one breeder. When animals are bred in partnership, each partnership is considered a unique breeder.

In keeping with the basic philosophy of the Holstein Association USA, ethics are an individual responsibility of the owner of each animal shown. Violations of these policies are subject to the disciplinary provisions of the Association Bylaws, Amended November 2017.

Junior Holstein Showing Policy

1. **Eligibility:** Exhibitors must be a minimum of nine years old to participate, but must not have reached their 21st birthday by January 1 in the year competing. Members who become 21 years of age during the current year will be allowed to compete in Junior activities until December 31st of the current year and not beyond that time. Exhibitors must be National Junior Members of the Holstein Association USA.
2. **Entries:** All animals must be registered by Holstein Association USA. The Junior Owner(s) or lease must be recorded on the registration certificate.
 - a. Animals must have a minimum of 87% Registered Holstein Ancestry (RHA) to be eligible for the designated shows.
3. **Ownership:** Animal must be registered in the name of the Junior member or a partnership of Junior members, throughout the year exhibiting in order to qualify for Junior recognition. Adult-Junior and family or farm partnerships are not acceptable.
4. All animals must have registration papers in the exhibitor's name or a photostatic copy of valid papers in process for registration or transfer (to be collected by the superintendent and forwarded to Holstein Association USA) to be eligible to show. Exhibitors must have a registration paper with photo identification or two eartags. No animal will be checked into the books without this proper identification.

For an animal (cow or heifer) being transferred to a Junior, or a partnership of Juniors, the transfer application must be received by the Holstein Association USA office on or before July 15.

The following actions will disqualify an animal from Junior recognition:

- Transferring an animal in or out of a Junior's name after July 15
 - Adding or dropping any adult or junior members as owners after the deadline
5. **Lease:** The Junior leasing program is designed to encourage young people to get involved in a dairy project and learn about animal care and responsibility. The leased animal remains in the original ownership and, if the leased animal is bred, any offspring are named using the owner's prefix.
 - a. The leasing program is not available to youth who concurrently own any Registered Holsteins either as an individual or in partnership. However, if the lessee becomes the owner of the animal anytime during the year exhibiting, they will qualify for junior recognition.
 - b. A maximum of two Registered Holsteins may be leased by any youth at one time. Animals may not be leased by partnerships.
 - c. The lease may be terminated by either the owner (lessor) or the youth (lessee) by providing written notice to the other party 45 or more days before the intended termination date. A Lease Termination Report must be filed with Holstein Association USA. If the animal has been sold, submitting an application for transfer of ownership will also terminate the lease.
 - d. The animal must be leased before she reaches her first birthday.
 - e. Leased animals may only be shown by the lessee (Junior). If a leased animal is shown by an adult, the lease is automatically terminated. The leasing Junior must show the animal at all shows; no substitutions may be made.

- f. The owner of an animal to be leased must submit the Certificate of Registration for that animal and a completed Application for Transfer, with the “Lease” box marked, to Holstein Association USA, Inc. All lease applications must be received by July 15 in the year exhibiting.
 - g. The fee to lease an animal is \$20. There is no fee to record a lease termination.
 - h. When a lease is initiated and approved, the Certificate of Registration will be printed with the lease details and mailed to the Junior lessee. When a lease is terminated and the Certificate of Registration is returned to Holstein Association USA, the lease termination will be recorded on the certificate and the certificate will be mailed to the owner. All leases expire on December 31 of the year in which the junior lessee becomes 21 years of age if not terminated prior to that date.
5. **Exhibition:** To be eligible to compete at national shows, entries must be shown by the Junior owner in all cases, except by prior written approval. Alternate Leadsperson forms must be submitted to the Holstein Representative by 5:00 p.m. the day before the show. If approved, another National Holstein Junior member the same age or younger than said exhibitor must show the animal. Adults are not allowed to show, in any case. A leased animal may only be shown by the Junior lessee.
 6. **Bred & Owned:** To be eligible for Junior Bred & Owned, at least one of the Junior owners must be listed as a breeder and owner on the registration certificate.
 7. **Partnership:** All animals must stand on the Association records in the individual name of the exhibitor. Adult-Junior partnerships will not be acceptable. Family or farm partnerships are not acceptable unless all members are Junior members and listed on the registration paper. The only acceptable partnership will consist of two or more Junior members. In case of partnership animals, all owners must not exceed 21 years of age as of January 1 of the participating year.
 8. **Violations:** If any of the above Junior Show Ring Policy is violated, all Junior exhibitors involved will lose all privileges for that show the following year.

1. Laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky;
2. Rules and Regulations of the North American International Livestock Exposition;
3. Rules and procedures specific to the NAILE Dairy Cattle Show; and
4. The PDCA Show Ring Code of Ethics (revised May, 2015).

Testing or inspection of any and all animals entered in The All American Jersey Show may be conducted by the General Manager of the North American International Livestock Exposition or designated agent before, during, or after the competition.

Any milkouts during the show, whether in individual classes or of the Intermediate and Senior Championship classes, will be at the discretion of the judge, the All American Executive Committee, and/or the AJCA Board of Directors.

Photographs

Exhibitors of the first and second place winners in each class are required to provide, at their expense, a professional photograph of the animal taken during the current show season to the *Jersey Journal* no later than December 1.

Classes

The first and second place winners of each class in The All American Jersey Show are recognized as the All American and Reserve All American of 2023 by the American Jersey Cattle Association.

Junior Females

Semex, Madison, WI, will present an award for the animal with the highest genomic JPI in classes 1-6. These individuals will then compete for GJPI Junior Champion.

4. Ultrasound screening: The top six cows are required to undergo ultrasound screening, milk sample tests, and any other test(s) required by NAILE at the conclusion of the Futurity. The judge, All American Executive Committee, and/or AJCA Board of Directors have the authority to request NAILE management to conduct random ultrasound and milk sample tests of any animal shown.

Any milkouts during the Futurity will be at the discretion of the judge, the All American Executive Committee and/or the AJCA Board of Directors.

Special Rules

1. Futurity Winner: The Winner of the National Jersey Jug Futurity qualifies for the Grand Champion class (class 29) of The All American Jersey Show. The Winner is **not** eligible to show in her class in the Open Show. The Breeder of the Winner earns first-place senior female points for calculation of the Premier Breeder Award. The Recorded Owner (exhibitor) for the Futurity earns first-place senior female points for calculation of the Premier Exhibitor Award, even if ownership changes before the Open Show.
2. Reserve Winner: The second-place cow (Reserve Winner) qualifies for the Grand Champion class (class 29),

with second-place senior female points awarded for calculation of Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor as described above. However, this cow has the option of being shown in her class in The All American Jersey Show. She will not be eligible for Grand Champion unless she wins her respective division champion class in the open show, and will earn Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor points **only** for the open show placing.

3. **Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor Points:** Cows placing third, fourth, fifth, and sixth in the Futurity (class 36) and that do not show in the Open Show will earn points for their placings as follows: for Premier Breeder, to the Breeder of record; for Premier Exhibitor, to the Recorded Owner when the cow was exhibited in the Futurity, even if ownership changes before the Open Show. *However, if shown in the Open Show, these points are forfeited and the cow will earn Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor points only for the Open Show placing.*
4. **Best Female Bred and Owned by Exhibitor:** Chosen from the highest ranking cow, bred and owned by the exhibitor, in each of the milking classes.
5. **Highest Ranking Junior-Owned Cow:** This special award recognizes the highest ranking cow that is shown in the Futurity in the recorded ownership, sole or partnership, of the junior leading it in the show. All other eligibility rules of The All American Jersey Junior Show will apply. Cows led by NAILE-approved alternate junior leadspersons are not eligible.
6. **Premier Performance Award:** Premier Performance points will be calculated as for class 33, with an award presented to the top-ranked cow shown in the Futurity. The two highest ranked cows qualify for class 32, unless they are shown in the open show and fail to qualify for class 33 based on their open show placing.
7. **Semex GJPI Class Award:** The cow with the highest GJPI in the class will be recognized with an award from Semex. She qualifies to show in Class 26 the next day and compete for GJPI Senior Champion. with payment in full must be postmarked by December 31, 2023. For nominations after the December 31 deadline, contact the AJCA Office.

3. It costs only \$60.00 to complete the nomination procedure for the National Jersey Jug Futurity. Every animal that shows earns at least that amount in premiums.
 - a. The nomination fee is \$7.00 per entry and must be sent to the National Jersey Jug Futurity and be postmarked by December 31, 2023. A one-time payment of \$60.00 per entry, non-refundable, may be made at the time of nomination.
 - b. The eligibility report and yearling fee of \$8.00 per entry must be sent to the National Jersey Jug Futurity and be postmarked by June 30, 2024.
 - c. The eligibility report and two-year-old fee of \$10.00 per entry must be sent to the National Jersey Jug Futurity and be postmarked by June 30, 2025.
 - d. The final nomination fee of \$35.00 and the eligibility report must be sent to the National Jersey Jug Futurity and be postmarked by September 20, 2026.

In case of transfer of a nominated animal, notify the National Jersey Jug Futurity of the change of ownership immediately. All premiums will be paid directly to the exhibitors by the North American International Livestock Exposition. The AJCA Youth Program, supported by proceeds of the National Heifer Sale, will provide an additional \$5,000.00 to be divided equally among junior exhibitors and paid directly to them by the American Jersey Cattle Association.

Eligibility Rules

1. Exhibitors. Exhibitors must be no younger than nine (9) and no older than 20 years of age as of January 1, 2023. U.S. residents must be members (junior or lifetime) of the American Jersey Cattle Association.
2. Entries. Animals are eligible when recorded by the American Jersey Cattle Association in the Herd Register or with Generation Count 4 or greater, or by Jersey Canada with registry status of 93.75% and greater.

The exhibitor must be listed as Recorded Owner on the registration certificate, either (1) as the sole owner or (2) by his/her name in joint ownership. If the joint ownership includes more than one person meeting the eligibility requirements of Rule 1 (above), one of them must be declared as the exhibitor during check-in.

Animals must be registered and/or transferred to meet one of the above ownership requirements on or before August 1, 2023. The date of registration and/or transfer is the Date Recorded printed on the registration certificate.

3. Participation. Entries must be shown by the exhibitor, except by prior written approval from NAILE. Alternate leadpersons must (1) be associated with the Herd Unit and also eligible to show by age (Rule 1, above), or (2) if not, be the same age or younger than the exhibitor of the animal being shown. Requests for alternate leadperson must be submitted for approval by the NAILE dairy show superintendent on forms provided by the AJCA no later than 12:00 noon the day before the show.

No more than two (2) animals may be shown by one exhibitor in any one class. The exhibitor must lead the

first entry, and the second entry must be led by a NAILE-approved alternate leadsperson.

Adults are not allowed to show in any case.

4. **Breeder Status.** In order to qualify for Premier Breeder points and Best Bred and Owned awards, the exhibitor declared at check-in must have his/her name recorded as a Breeder on the animal's registration certificate. These awards will be made only to the individual exhibitor in the case of partnership animals.

Entry forms for Premier Junior Breeder and Premier Junior Exhibitor will be distributed at check-in. Submit forms by 6:00 p.m. on the day prior to the show at the AJCA booth.

5. **Substitutions.** Substitutions are allowed within the same class by the same Recorded Owner. In addition, two out-of-class substitutions will be allowed per junior exhibitor. Once a Jersey animal has been substituted in either the Junior or Open show, the animal originally entered shall be eliminated from any further competition.
6. **Photographs.** Exhibitors of the first and second place winners of each class are required to provide, at their expense, a professional photograph of the animal taken during the current show season to the *Jersey Journal* no later than December 1.
7. **ALL EXHIBITORS AND NAILE-APPROVED ALTERNATE LEADSPERSONS ARE REQUIRED TO WEAR JERSEY EXHIBITOR SHIRTS, WHITE TROUSERS, AND SHOW HARNESES. EXHIBITORS NOT IN COMPLIANCE WITH THIS RULE WILL NOT BE PERMITTED TO ENTER THE RING.**

Statement on Ethics

Participants in The All American Jersey Junior Show, including but not limited to owners, exhibitors, fitters, and absolutely responsible persons, are cautioned to read, fully understand, and comply with all of the following:

- (1) Laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky;
- (2) Rules and Regulations of the North American International Livestock Exposition;
- (3) Rules and procedures specific to the NAILE Dairy Cattle Department; and
- (4) The PDCA Show Ring Code of Ethics (revised May, 2015)

Testing or inspection of any and all animals entered in The All American Jersey Junior Show may be conducted by the General Manager of the North American International Livestock Exposition or designated agent before, during, or after the competition.

Any milkouts during the show, whether in individual classes or the championship classes, will be at the discretion of the judge, the All American Executive Committee, and/or the AJCA Board of Directors.

The first and second place winners of each class in The All American Jersey Junior Show are recognized as the Junior All American and Reserve Junior All American of 2023 by the American Jersey Cattle Association.

Rules

Eligibility to Purchase

Animals in the Pot O’ Gold Sale can only be purchased by juniors who are between the ages of 7 and 20 (inclusive) on January 1 of the sale year, and who reside in the United States or Canada. A junior may purchase only one Pot O’ Gold calf per contest year.

Related or unrelated youth may purchase an animal to be transferred to them in partnership. A junior may not purchase an animal consigned by a member of his or her immediate family.

Loss, death, or transfer of ownership of any purchase before the record is complete will eliminate the heifer and owner(s) from the Pot O’ Gold Production Contest.

Production Contest

Seventeen percent (17%) of the gross sales will be set aside in a Pot O’ Gold Fund. This fund will provide cash awards for the owners of the 22 calves that complete the highest records ranked by total product value.

Testing Requirements

All heifers must be tested in a DHI herd owned by the purchaser, or the purchaser’s parent(s) or legal guardian(s). In the event this is not possible, a written request to test the heifer in another herd must be made to the All American Executive Committee by December 31 of the year the heifer is purchased. In any case, the heifer cannot be tested in the herd(s) owned by her breeder and/or consignor.

DHI records will be confirmed by files obtained from the Council on Dairy Cattle Breeding (CDCB). If completed in Canada, records must be a form of test recognized by the American Jersey Cattle Association (AJCA) or Jersey Canada.

Eligible Records

Records must be submitted to the American Jersey Cattle Association no later than July 1 of the contest year. Only first-lactation records are accepted, provided the heifer calves before 30 months of age.

Records must have a minimum Data Collection Rating (DCR) of 90 to qualify.

Rankings are determined by adjusting the records for age and month of calving using USDA regional factors (305-day, 2x, m.e.) provided by the Council on Dairy Cattle Breeding, then applying FMMO protein, butterfat, and other solids values for the previous calendar year (e.g., 2022 for 2023 production contest), plus a weighted average PPD.

- All NAILE Rules and Regulations and General Rules of the Dairy Cattle Department apply.
- **All exhibitors will be required to wear show harnesses while exhibiting their animals.**
- The judge will name best udder in each milking class.
- **Any animal sold or exhibited (including but not limited to class winners, Champion, and Reserve Champion) as registered by the American Milking Shorthorn Society can be blood/DNA typed at the discretion of the Executive Secretary or AMSS Representative. AMSS Policy as of June 2019, states all champions and reserve champions will be DNA and Genomics tested, with all expenses to be paid by AMSS.**

Eligibility

Animals eligible to show at the national show level in the United States and Canada are eligible to exhibit. All United States animals must be registered in the full herdbook of and have registry certificates issued by the American Milking Shorthorn Society. The certificate must be white and must not have the words “Not eligible to show” printed near the Executive Secretary or AMSS Representative signature or as a watermark across the page. Animals with a prefix of GI, GI2, GR, and GE are not eligible to be shown. Females with a 36000 or 37000 registration number are not eligible to be shown. Tattoo numbers, fair tags, and/or RFID tags must correspond with the registry certificates. All Canadian animals must be registered in the Canadian Milking Shorthorn Society official herdbook, be 75% purity or greater, and be true to breed standard for Milking Shorthorn type and color. Any Milking Shorthorn with black hair cannot be shown unless released by the AMSS Executive Secretary or AMSS Representative.

Specific Rules of Eligibility

1. To be eligible to be shown, a Milking Shorthorn base hair color must be red, white, or roan (red and white intermixed). No other base color is allowed.
2. Disqualifications for color beyond rule 1 above include animals that are brindled with diffuse black hairs on locations other than the edge of the ear, edge of the muzzle, or nape of the shoulder, or animals that have more than one location with black hair on other parts of the body.
3. “Black Hair” for purpose of these rules refers to hair that is black the entire length of the shaft to the root.
4. Minimal black hair described as “ticking” around the edge of the ears, edge of the muzzle, and shoulder nape is permissible.
5. An animal is eligible to be shown if it has no more than one “spot” of black hair smaller than four square inches.
6. “Black Spot” refers to areas of solid black hair or areas of black roan with diffuse white or red hairs intermixed.
7. Measurement is made around the distinct edge of the area in question.
8. If an animal has one spot larger than four square inches, or more than one spot, it is ineligible to be shown.
9. Any animal with one spot smaller than four square inches that is to be shown must be blood/DNA typed for parental identification. If parental ID is confirmed, the animal is eligible thereafter for all show and national awards.
10. Any animal the Executive Secretary or AMSS Representative examines and finds to have one or multiple black spots, regardless of eligibility for showing, is required to be blood/DNA typed for parental identification to maintain registry status.
11. As there exists a lack of uniformity in varying show venues across the country in response to enforcement of the

Black Hair Rule, the Board of AMSS has stipulated the following: only the Executive Secretary of the American Milking Shorthorn Society or AMSS Representative shall have authority in determining eligibility of animals under the Black Hair Rule. The Executive Secretary or AMSS Representative is required to be in attendance at all accredited national shows.

12. When the Executive Secretary of the American Milking Shorthorn Society or AMSS Representative is in attendance at a national show, or if she/he is at any other venue in which Milking Shorthorns are being exhibited as registered cattle in the AMSS Herd Book, she/he may, at their discretion, or at the request of either the owner of an animal or other exhibitor, examine an animal for eligibility due to the above color requirements or other considerations.
13. If the Executive Secretary or AMSS Representative is requested by a party other than the owner to examine an animal for any reason, the person requesting the examination must first post a \$150 nonrefundable fee with the Executive Secretary or AMSS Representative.

American Milking Shorthorn Society Definitions for Breeder and Exhibitor

Breeder – The breeder of the animal shall be the name of the person, farm, or partnership, as it appears on the registry certificate (owner of dam at time of service). Where a herd is registered in the names of different members of an immediate family (grand/parents, spouse, siblings, grand/children), but the prefix remains the same, all entries may be considered as exhibits of one breeder. When animals are bred in partnership or syndicates, each unique entity is considered a unique breeder.

Bred and Owned – To be eligible for Bred & Owned awards, one of the breeders must be listed as one of the current owners. Where a herd is registered in the names of different members of an immediate family (grand/parents, spouse, siblings, grand/children), and one of those members is an owner, that entry may be considered as Bred and Owned. If a breeder was part of a partnership and remains as an owner, then the animal is considered Bred and Owned.

Exhibitor – The exhibitor must be an owner of the animal and appear on the registry certificate. Where a herd is registered or bred in the names of different members of an immediate family (grand/parents, spouse, siblings, grand/children), and where Herd Unit requirements are met, all entries may be considered as a single exhibitor. When animals are owned in partnership or syndicate, each unique entity is considered a unique exhibitor.

Herd Unit – If a herd is registered in the names of different members of an immediate family (grand/parents, spouse, siblings, grand/children), of the herd owner, these persons may be considered one breeder/exhibitor. To be considered part of the Herd Unit, all animals must be: a) Housed in the same location (same premise ID); b) Under the exclusive care and management of the herd owner; c) Health tested and production tested with the owner's herd – All animals listed on the same forms with the same herd code; and d) When the "Herd Unit" option is elected, all animals owned and exhibited by any member of the unit must be shown under the "Herd Unit" entry. A list of names of all individuals owning animals included in the "Herd Unit" and the name of the "Herd Unit" must be submitted with the application for entry and will be considered as one exhibitor throughout the show.

Partner or syndicate owned animals are not included under a Herd Unit.

Any uncertainty, or dispute, with the above definitions should be addressed with the AMSS Executive Secretary (or AMSS Representative present at the show) prior to the show. Their decision will be final.

Show Rules

1. **Eligibility:** Participation in this show is open to youth with registered Milking Shorthorns. Exhibitors must be a minimum of nine years old but not have reached their 21st birthday by January 1st in the year competing. Members who become 21 years of age during the current year will be allowed to compete in Junior activities until December 31 of the current year. Youth must be a member of the American Milking Shorthorn Junior Society by August 1 of the current year. If the youth is not a member by August 1, he/she must join before the show by paying the \$25 junior membership fee and an additional \$5 penalty to become a junior member, payable to the American Milking Shorthorn Junior Society and turned into the AMSS Executive Secretary or AMSS Representative.
2. **Registration:** All animals must be registered in the full herd book of and have registry certificates issued by the American Milking Shorthorn Society. The certificate must be white and must not have the word “Not eligible to show” near the Executive Secretary’s or AMSS Representative’s signature or as a watermark across the page. Animals with a prefix of GI, GI2, GR, and GE are not eligible to be shown. Females with a 36000 or 37000 registration number are not eligible to be shown. Tattoo numbers, fair tags, and/or RFID tags must correspond with the registry certificates. Registration papers will be checked at the show by show management.
3. **Ownership:** Ownership of the animal must be recorded in the AMSS herdbook in the name of the junior exhibitor(s) by August 1 of the current year. Animals may be owned in partnerships; however, all members of the partnership must be paid junior members of AMSJS and the animal must be owned by August 1. The following will disqualify an animal from junior show participation and recognition in the current year: Transferring an animal in or out of a junior’s name after August 1 of the show year or adding/dropping a junior member and/or adult as an owner after the deadline.
4. **Lease:** Animals that are leased through the American Milking Shorthorn Junior Society Lease Program are also eligible to be shown by juniors. Leases must be on file with the AMSS office by August 1 of the current year. Lessee must be a paid American Milking Shorthorn Junior Member. The junior who leases the animal must show her. Only one AMSJS Junior Member may appear on each individual lease per animal. Multiple juniors are not permitted to lease the same animal. Alternate leadsperson are not permitted for leased animals except for an unforeseen circumstance.
5. **Participation:** Up to two animals may be exhibited by each exhibitor in any one class. One animal must be shown by an owner listed on the registration certificate who is a paid National Junior Member. The second animal may be shown if the alternate leadsperson form is completed. All rules for the alternate leadsperson form apply. A Junior can own multiple animals in a given class, but only two may be exhibited. Additional animals must be leased by another Junior or if animal is owned in a partnership, the animals can be exhibited by another member of the partnership.
6. **Alternate Leadsperson:** The junior who owns the animal is to show her. If the owner cannot attend the show, an Alternate Leadsperson must be a National Milking Shorthorn Junior member, who is the same age or younger or up to three years older than the owner OR who is a sibling (full, half, step, foster) of the owner. All Alternate Leadspersons must meet the age guidelines of a minimum of nine years old but not have reached their 21st birthday by January 1 in the year competing. Alternate Leadspersons may show the animal with approval of the Executive Secretary. A Request for Alternate Leadsperson form must be submitted to the AMSS Executive Secretary or AMSS Representative by 5:00 p.m. the day before the show. Requests must be submitted by this time, or the animal is ineligible to show, unless there is an unforeseen circumstance. The Request for Alternate Leadsperson form is available at www.milkingshorthorn.com or from show management. The only exception to this rule is for an alternate leadsperson for showing/leading in the Champion Classes (Junior, Intermediate, Senior, and/or Grand). An Alternate Leadsperson in the champion classes must meet the junior age guideline

but does not have to be a National Milking Shorthorn Junior member.

7. **Bred & Owned:** As of January 1, 2022, to be eligible for Junior Bred & Owned, the owner of the animal must match exactly the breeder of the animal on the registration paper.
8. The AMSS Hair Color Regulations must be followed.
9. According to the AMSS DNA Policy dated June 16, 2016, National Show Champions: Animals winning one of the following titles at an AMSS National Show must be genotyped and DNA typed to maintain their title. This includes both Junior and Open divisions. All expenses to be paid by AMSS.
 - a. Junior Champion
 - b. Reserve Junior Champion
 - c. Intermediate Champion
 - d. Reserve Intermediate Champion
 - e. Senior Champion
 - f. Reserve Senior Champion
 - g. Total Performance Champion
10. Only the AMSS Executive Secretary or AMSS Representative shall have authority in determining the eligibility of animals and ownership for numbers 1-8.

Show Rules

1. These are separate shows using the Red & White Dairy Cattle Association (RWDCA) classes for Red and Whites only.
2. The RWDCA will accept registration papers and/or a certificate of identification (CID) from Holstein Association USA. Other registration papers accepted will be from RWDCA, Holstein Association USA showing the suffix “RED,” and Holstein Canada.
3. All owners shown on registration papers must be a member in good standing of RWDCA.
4. Animals must be Red and White in physical color. Any animals in question of this color status must submit a DNA sample to an accredited lab for a full genomic panel to prove color and identification of the animal in question. Results must be shared with RWDCA.
5. If for any reason an animal is in question for eligibility, the RWDCA management will be contacted before a final decision is rendered.
6. Eligibility of animals and RWDCA members will be determined on a show-to-show basis.
7. In order to enter/exhibit at any national and/or approved shows, Red and White animals must carry 87% dairy bloodlines as designated by RWDCA guidelines. Dairy bloodlines include: Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein (Black & White and Red & White), Jersey, Milking Shorthorn, Angler, Swedish Red, Aussie Red, Lineback, and Rouge Flammande.
8. RWDCA will assist show management determining membership status with a list of entries one week prior to the show.
9. All requirements listed above must be met 24 hours before the start of the show.
10. Following the show, show management must provide RWDCA with a report that lists all placings, champions, etc.
11. After RWDCA receives the national show report, with individual class placings and champion information, the results will be entered into the animal’s permanent record.
12. For questions about the above said rules, contact RWDCA staff.
13. **Red & White Dairy Cattle are eligible to enter and compete in only one breed classification regardless if the animal is registered with one or more breed associations or registries. Animals must be exhibited as entered on the original entry form. Switching between breeds will not be allowed. Animals must be shown in the same breed for both the Open and Junior Dairy Show.**

Official Show Status

1. Official show status means that results of the show will become part of the animal's permanent record. Individual class placings are entered into the computer. A complete record of show placings is kept in the RWDCA files.
2. See "Approved Show Specifications" for complete rules and regulations.
3. See "Approved Shows-List and contact Info" for list of approved shows.
4. Official status may be granted by the RWDCA office staff. A letter from the show management requesting approved status and stating they will adhere to these rules is required to be an approved show for the All-American contest. Board action (or Executive Committee action, if necessary) is needed to revoke official status.

Show Rules

1. The Junior Red & White show will be held at the same time as the open show. Juniors will be recognized, placed, and presented awards by stepping forward in their respective open show class with the exception of the Premier National Junior Show-Harrisburg, PA, and Mideast Fall Red & White Show-Louisville, KY. **Please note that the Junior Red & White Show and Open Red & White Show are held separately at NAILE in Louisville.**
2. Exhibitors may participate after they reach nine years of age and until December 31 of the year in which he or she turns 21 years of age. All owners (exhibitors) must be in good standing with the Red & White Dairy Cattle Association (RWDCA).
3. Animals must be Red and White in physical color. Any animals in question of this color status must submit a DNA sample to an accredited lab for a full genomic panel to prove color and identification of the animal in question. Results must be shared with RWDCA.
4. In order to enter/exhibit at any national and/or approved shows, Red & White animals must carry 87% dairy bloodlines as designated by RWDCA guidelines. Dairy bloodlines include: Ayshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein (Black & White and Red & White), Jersey, Milking Shorthorn, Angler, Swedish Red, Aussie Red, Lineback, and Rouge Flammande.
5. The RWDCA will accept registration papers and/or a certificate of identification (CID) from Holstein Association USA. Other registration papers accepted will be from RWDCA, Holstein Association USA showing the suffix “RED,” and Holstein Canada.
6. LEASE: All animals must be owned or leased by the junior by **July 15** of the current year.

TRANSFER: For an animal (cow or heifer) being transferred to a Junior, or a partnership of Juniors, the transfer application must be received by the Holstein Association USA office on or before **July 15**, with the exception of animals purchased by and/or leased to a junior at the RWDCA National Convention.

7. OWNERSHIP: Two or more juniors may own an animal. One junior must be on the halter to receive junior recognition. Awards will be presented as one unit, to all owners equally.
8. Entries must be shown by the junior owner in all cases, except by prior written approval. An alternate leadsperson request form must be hand written, emailed, or faxed at least 24 hours before the start of show, explaining in specifics your reason for the absence. Final approval will be by the RWDCA. It is noted that any alternate leadsperson form can be turned into the RWDCA office staff in advance of the show, if you know of upcoming conflicts. The form must include: name, age, and signature of junior owner, cell phone number of a contact person, class of animal, name and age of alternate leadspersons (up to three listed), and the reason the junior owner needs an alternate. If approved, the alternate leadsperson must be the same age or younger of the junior owner. The alternate must also be an RWDCA junior member. Adults are not allowed to show in any case. If more than one animal owned by the same junior is eligible for the championship class, another eligible junior may show the other animal. Final approval will be decided by RWDCA staff and/or a member(s) of the RWDCA Board of Directors. The junior requesting this form **must** have led their animal once at a national, state, or county show before approval at any fall show.
9. Dress code will be strictly enforced for juniors. White pants with an official show shirt must be worn or the junior will not be allowed to show (World Dairy Expo, Madison, WI; Premier National Junior Show, Harrisburg, PA; and Mideast Fall Red & White show, Louisville, KY).

10. Junior show classes consist of all female classes except Best Uddered of Show. There will be no junior show group classes except Junior State Herd.
11. Bred & Owned: To be eligible for Junior Bred & Owned, the name(s) listed as the breeder and owner on the Registration Certificate must be the same.
12. **Red & White Dairy Cattle are eligible to enter and compete in only one breed classification regardless if the animal is registered with one or more breed associations or registries. Animals must be exhibited as entered on the original entry form. Switching between breeds will not be allowed. Animals must be shown in the same breed for both the Open and Junior Dairy Show.**
